

## Deferred Action for Parents of U.S Citizens and Lawful Permanent Residents

<b>Deferred Action for Parental Accountability ((DAPA)</b>	
<b>Who is eligible</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• An undocumented individual living in the United States who, on the date of the announcement, is the parent of a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident and who meets the guidelines listed below.</li></ul>
<b>What the initiative will do</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Allows parents to request deferred action and employment authorization if they:<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Have continuous residence in the United States since January 1, 2010;</li><li>• Are the parents of a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident born on or before November 20, 2014; and</li><li>• Are not an enforcement priority for removal from the United States, pursuant to the November 20, 2014, <a href="#">Policies for the Apprehension, Detention and Removal of Undocumented Immigrants Memorandum</a>.</li></ul></li></ul> <p>Notes: USCIS will consider each request for Deferred Action for Parental Accountability (DAPA) on a case-by-case basis. Enforcement priorities include (but are not limited to) national security and public safety threats.</p>
<b>When you can begin to make a request</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Approximately 180 days following the President's November 20, 2014, announcement.</li></ul>
